Herb of the Year:

Chamomile

The International Herb Association has selected Chamomile as the 2025 Herb of the Year. Herbs that are selected by the association must be superior in two of three major categories. And these categories are decorative, medicinal, and culinary. According to the website for Heyden Gardens, Chamomile has two distinctly different plants that share the same name. "German Chamomile (Matricaria camomilla/recutita) and Roman Chamomile (Chamaemelum nobile). While their flowers and foliage are similar in appearance, they differ in size, life cycle, and use, so we will address each separately."

The German chamomile variety is a self-seeding annual plant. It has small self-seeding flowers, and it is very fragrant. It has a ferny foliage which grows up to 30 inches tall. The leaves and flowers can be dried to make tea which is consumed for its calming properties. (I know I have a cup of chamomile tea often to help me sleep when I am restless at night.) Other medicinal qualities of chamomile are believed to be anti-inflammatory, anti-allergenic, and anti-bacterial qualities.

Roman chamomile is a hardy plant and a perennial. It is considered more decorative than the German variety with its small flowers resembling daisies growing over low foliage with apple-scented leaves. It grows to a height of 6-10 inches, and it is sometimes utilized in a chamomile lawn for a fragrant lawn of little maintenance. Its culinary uses are for making tea. This type of lawn is known as an eco-friendly alternative to turf grass. Medicinal characteristics of the Roman variety of chamomile are that it is believed to lessen fever, headaches, stomach problems, and inflammation. Fragrant essential oils are contained in its leaves. The oils are used for perfumes in aromatherapy for their calming properties.
