Monday, JULY 7 at 7 PM – A Community Event Tuesday, JULY 8 at 11 AM – A THS Member Event



## Did you know?

Hummingbirds weigh  $\frac{1}{4}$  of an ounce and are 3.5" in length! Their wings propel them at 55 beats per second in flight, and when they are dive bombing another hummingbird or trying to impress females, wings beat 220 times per second. Their heart beats 600 times per minute (up to 1200 times) with 250 breaths per minute, and their average lifespan is 3 - 4 years, but they can live 12 - 14 years. They drink with a back-and-forth motion of tongue, 13 licks per second.

Planting for our hummingbird friends? Try salvia, petunias, honeysuckle, and trumpet vine.

## HERB OF THE MONTH REPORT

# NONE OF YOUR BUSINESS

## Soleirolia Soleirolii



I chose a funny named plant for June. Before I tell you about it, I'll tell you how I came to choose it

We watch a lot of British TV in our house. Our favorites are what we call "murder"; these are detective/police/mystery style shows. One we are currently watching is *Rosemary & Thyme*. It's about two women gardeners who always happen upon one or more dead bodies while they are redoing or restoring historic gardens in England—sometimes even traveling to the continent to garden there. One episode recently had the duo restoring an old herb garden in a monastery. It was to be the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the garden, and the Queen was coming to open it after the restoration was complete. While they were in line to meet the Queen, Laura Thyme had a plant in her hand, and the Queen inquired what the name of this plant was. When she answered, "Mind Your Own Business," I was intrigued and wondered if there really was a plant with that name. So off to the land of "Google that" I went. The name certainly made an impression on me as I'm sure it did the Queen!

Mind Your Own Business, (a.k.a., *Soleirolia soleirolii*) was named after Lt. Henri Augustine Soleirol who discovered it growing wild in Corsica. He was a French military engineer who was keen on botany and the arts. Some common names are Baby Tears, Corsican Creeper, and

Friendship Plant. This plant belongs to the stinging nettle family although it does not actually sting. It grows 2-4" tall, prefers shade, and is frost tender, so expect some dieback in the winter; however, it recovers quickly and has tiny white flowers. It roots along the stems, grows quickly, and is usually sold as a houseplant but can be grown outside. It can become a problem if it gets into the lawn where it can be difficult to control.

Mind Your Own Business was first cultivated in Britain in 1905 as a promising rock garden plant. It was a Victorian favorite where they used it below benches in conservatories and in between rock paths. It is called Mind Your Own Business due to its tendency to spread rapidly and sometimes aggressively invading other parts of your garden or lawn. Some think it is spread on the bottom of your shoes from one part of the garden to another.

It was a fun plant to learn about with a name you won't easily forget as long as you "Mind Your Own Business." Haha!
