JULY 7 & 8 SPECIAL SPEAKER EVENT WITH STEVE DOBBS


Horticulturist Steve Dobbs has over 40 years' experience in various roles of the green industry working in horticulture education, landscape maintenance, design, and greenhouse plant production.

Most recently Steve retired from Oklahoma State University after 12 years as Director of Landscape Services, where he was responsible for over 700 acres of design, installation, and maintenance.

Steve is author of "The Southern Lawn Series" and the *Oklahoma Gardener's Guide*. From 1990-1995, Steve hosted the OSU-produced, OETA television show, "Oklahoma Gardening."

Steve received his Bachelor of Science degree in Horticulture from OSU and a Master of Science degree in Horticulture from the University of Arkansas.

Steve now resides in eastern Oklahoma on his family farm with his wife Jo Alice, where they garden, raise angus cattle, and volunteer at McKey Community Church.

HERB OF THE MONTH

Green Santolina

Santolina Rosmarinifolia



Green Santolina is my favorite herb in the garden because it is beautiful foliage and it smells even better. I don't use green santolina in cooking – I just like to look at it and run my fingers through the dark green, feathery leaves to release the beautiful olive fragrance. For this reason, I have it planted right next to my rock path within easy reach.

Green Santolina, also known as green lavender cotton, holy flax, or wadi tops is a neatly rounded evergreen shrub from the Mediterranean. It requires full sun and well-drained (preferably sandy) soil and seems to tolerate drought very well. And, it is a perfect shrub for lazy gardeners! Care should be taken not to over-water or over-fertilize this plant. I prune my plant back in the late winter or early spring to keep it from getting too leggy.

In early summer, Green Santolina is covered with 1-inch pale yellow button flowers on long stems. The flowers are tightly multi-petaled as this plant is a member of the Asteraceae family (commonly known as the aster family). Here's a photo from my garden taken a few years back – Green Santolina is a hardy perennial.
